

**APPROVING THE EXTENSION OF THE MAYOR'S EXECUTIVE ORDER 08-2020
EXTENDING THE DECLARATION OF A PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY DUE TO THE
COVID-19 VIRUS AND TEMPORARY CLOSING OF WASHINGTON PARK**

WHEREAS, both the President and the Governor have declared a public health emergency for the Novel Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic outbreak; and

WHEREAS, on July 16, 2020, Mayor Duane Parry issued his Executive Order 08-2020, Extending The Declaration Of A Public Health Emergency Due To The Coronavirus Pandemic & Ordering the Temporary Closure of Washington Park, a copy of which Executive Order 08-2020 is attached hereto as Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, IC 10-14-3-29 requires the Council's consent for the Executive Order 08-2020 to remain in effect for more than seven (7) days; and

WHEREAS, the Council finds that the COVID-19 virus pandemic emergency will exist for an extended period of time beyond seven (7) days from the issuance of Executive Order 08-2020, the precise length of which is not determinable at this time; and

WHEREAS, the Council supports the issuance of the Executive Order 08-2020 and finds that it is in the best interest of the citizens of Michigan City that the Executive Order 08-2020 be extended beyond seven (7) days until 11:59 p.m. on July 30, 2020 or until such time as the Mayor determines that the spread of COVID-19 no longer poses a threat to the citizens of Michigan City, whichever period is shorter.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Michigan City Common Council that it approves Mayor Duane Parry's issuance of his Executive Order 05-2020 Declaring A Public Health Emergency Due To The Coronavirus Pandemic & Implementing Certain Public Health And Safety Measures (Executive Order) and consents to it being effective and in full force and effect until 11:59 p.m. on July 30, 2020 or until such time as the Mayor determines that the spread of COVID-19 no longer poses a threat to the citizens of Michigan City, whichever period is shorter.

This Resolution shall be in full force and effect after passage by the Michigan City Common Council and the approval by the Mayor.

**DECLARATION OF A PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY DUE TO THE
CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC & ORDERING THE TEMPORARY CLOSURE OF
WASHINGTON PARK**

WHEREAS, on March 6, 2020, by virtue of Executive Order No. 20-02¹, Indiana Governor Eric Holcomb first declared the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak a statewide public health disaster emergency; and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 to be a global pandemic, and on March 13, 2020 the President of the United States declared a national emergency with respect to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, to reduce and slow the spread of COVID-19, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Indiana State Department of Health (ISDH) recommended implementation of mitigation strategies to contain the virus including limitations on large gatherings and social distancing measures; and

WHEREAS, on April 7, 2020, by virtue of Executive Order No. 04-2020, I first declared a public health emergency because of COVID-19 and implemented public health and safety measures, which included the temporary closure of Washington Park; and

WHEREAS, as of July 14, 2020², the Indiana Health Department reported that there were 53,370 positive cases of COVID-19 and 2,592 deaths resulting from COVID-19 in the State of Indiana, and in particular, LaPorte County had a total of 648 positive cases of COVID-19 and 28 deaths resulting from COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, the statistical data on LaPorte County, as provided by the Indiana Health Department, is still showing an increase in the number of COVID-19 cases; and

WHEREAS, in addition to the growing COVID-19 cases in LaPorte County, and on a national level, numerous states across the U.S. are reporting record number of outbreaks of the virus; and

WHEREAS, despite the increase in COVID-19 cases in our county, state, and throughout the nation, Michigan City's Washington Park has experienced unusually large attendance levels, which include numerous out-of-county visitors and out-of-state visitors, over the recent weeks causing difficulty for patrons to comply with COVID-19 social distancing requirements and CDC guidelines; and

¹ Governor Holcomb has issued numerous executive orders since Executive Order No. 20-02 extending the statewide public health disaster emergency. Yesterday, during his press conference, Governor Holcomb advised that he was going to again extend his prior Executive Orders (see Governor Holcomb's Executive Order No. 20-35 and No. 20-34, which are the most recent orders as of the issuance of this Executive Order).

² When I issued Executive Order No. 04-2020, on April 7, 2020, the Indiana Health Department reported that there were 5,507 positive cases of COVID-19 and 173 deaths resulting from COVID-19 in the State of Indiana, and in particular, LaPorte County, Indiana had 25 positive cases of COVID-19 and 3 deaths resulting from COVID-19

WHEREAS, Chicago Mayor, Lori Lightfoot, ordered the closure of all Chicago beaches and to date has not reopened the beaches due to COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, in addition, the Mayor of Whiting, Indiana recently closed Whihala Beach due to public safety concerns because of the unusually large crowds also exceeding normal summer attendance; and

WHEREAS, in an effort to try to combat COVID-19, at last night LaPorte County Commissioner's meeting, the LaPorte County Health Department issued a Public Health Order mandating facial coverings in LaPorte County as follows:

"A. Face Covering Mandate

Every individual must properly wear a face covering over their nose and mouth when they are at:

1. An indoor area open to the public, including public transportation;
2. An outdoor public area where a distance of 6 feet from individuals outside of their household cannot be maintained; or
3. A private indoor or outdoor area where a distance of 6 feet from individuals outside of their household cannot be maintained....;" and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that weather temperatures will again exceed 90 degrees this week and the heat index may exceed 100 degrees by this weekend; and

WHEREAS, given the extreme heat temperatures, compliance with the LaPorte County Health Department mask mandate orders would be difficult, if not impossible to achieve, while patrons are sunbathing, swimming on the lakefront, and engaging in outdoor activities; and

WHEREAS, because of the unprecedented large numbers of visitors to Washington Park, social distancing, compliance with CDC guidelines, and compliance with the mask mandate from the LaPorte County Health Department cannot be effectively maintained to prevent the spread of COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to I.C. § 36-4-5-2, I, as the Mayor of Michigan City, Indiana, serve as the Executive of the City; and

WHEREAS, I.C. § 10-14-3-1 provides that an epidemic or other public-health emergency may constitute a disaster supporting the declaration of a disaster emergency; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to I.C. § 10-14-3-29, a local disaster emergency may be declared by the principal executive officer of a political subdivision and may not be continued or renewed for more than seven (7) days except by or with the consent of the governing board of the political subdivision; and


WHEREAS, in addition to I.C. § 10-14-3-29, Michigan City Municipal Code Sec. 34-1 provides the Mayor with the ability to declare an emergency; and

WHEREAS, in an effort to attempt to flatten the curve, slow the spread, and/or stop the spread of COVID-19 in our community, it is in the best interest of the public and our residents that I declare an emergency in our community caused by COVID-19 and order the temporary closure of Washington Park, the Senior Center, Fedder's Alley, the Zoo, and all parking areas within said vicinities, with the exception of weddings previously scheduled with the Michigan City Park Department.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, I, Duane Parry, Mayor of Michigan City, Indiana, do hereby issue the following Executive Order:

1. The local disaster emergency in the City of Michigan City, Indiana shall be effective at 12:01 a.m. CST on Friday, July 17, 2020. This emergency is attributable to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.
2. This declaration shall continue through 11:59 p.m. on July 23, 2020, unless the Common Council consents to an extension. Should the Common Council decline to extend, this declaration will expire at 11:59 p.m. on July 23, 2020, unless the Michigan City Park Department orders the closure of any facilities and property under its' jurisdiction.
3. With the exception of weddings previously scheduled with the Michigan City Park Department, I hereby order the temporary closure of Washington Park, which shall include but not be limited to the Senior Center, Fedder's Alley, the Zoo, and all parking areas within said vicinities. The closure of Washington Park shall include the closure of the beachfront from Washington Park through Stop 13. There shall be no traffic, (vehicular, pedestrian, motorcyclist, and bicyclist traffic, or otherwise) through Washington Park and the closed parking facilities.
4. Violations of this emergency order are punishable under I.C. § 10-14-3-24 and I.C. § 10-14-3-34.

WHEREAS, in addition, I.C. 36-7-4-602 (b) states as follows: “*(b) After the zoning ordinance for a jurisdiction has been adopted as described in subsection (a), the following procedure applies to a proposal to amend or partially repeal the text (not zone maps) of the ordinance:*

- (1) The plan commission may initiate the proposal. (Under the advisory planning law or the area planning law, any participating legislative body also may initiate the proposal and require the plan commission to prepare it.)*
- (2) The plan commission must prepare the proposal so that it is consistent with section 601 of this chapter.*
- (3) The plan commission and the legislative body both must comply with section 603 of this chapter.*
- (4) The plan commission must give notice and hold a public hearing under section 604 of this chapter.*
- (5) The plan commission must certify the proposal to the legislative body under section 605 of this chapter.*
- (6) The legislative body must consider the proposal under section 607 of this chapter, and section 607 of this chapter governs whether the proposal is adopted or defeated.*
- (7) If the proposal is adopted under section 607 of this chapter, the plan commission must print the amendments to the zoning ordinance under section 610 of this chapter.*
- (8) The amendments take effect as described in section 610 of this chapter;” and*

CREATING SECTION 94-79 IN DIVISION 3 OF CHAPTER 94 OF THE MICHIGAN CITY MUNICIPAL CODE ADDING PROVISIONS REGARDING TRAFFIC WARNING SIGNS FOR CHILDREN WITH HEARING OR VISION IMPAIRMENT OR A DISABILITY

WHEREAS, the Common Council has determined that, in the interest in increasing the safety of the children of Michigan City with vision or hearing impairment or diagnosed with a disability, the need exists for traffic control signs to be installed warning of the presence of such children; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council finds that the Michigan City Board of Public Works and Safety should determine where such children safety signs should be installed in the City upon appropriate written requests of parents or caretakers of such children.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Michigan City Common Council that Section 94-79 be added to Division 3 of Chapter 94 of the Michigan City Municipal Code to read as follows:

Sec. 94-79. Warning Signs For Impaired Children.

The Board of Public Works and Safety is authorized to have traffic control signs warning of the presence of children with vision or hearing impairments or children diagnosed with a disability. Such signs may be installed where, in the Board's opinion, there is a particular danger to such children if a written application to the Board for such a sign at the location meets the following criteria:

- 1.) The sign and the usage of the sign complies with the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUCTD).
- 2.) A fully and properly completed application to the Board that includes a certification signed by a qualified licensed medical professional certifying the child is vision or hearing impaired or is physically disabled.
- 3.) The child is between the age of two (2) and fifteen (15) years of age at the time of the request.
- 4.) The child resides within the corporate limits of Michigan City and lives on a residential street with a post speed limit of at least 25 mph.
- 5.) Applicant provides proof of residency (copy of driver's license, property tax notice, utility billing or other documentation).
- 6.) Applicant agrees to provide proof of residency prior to January 1st of each subsequent year of the application, and if such proof is not provided, the sign will be removed.
- 7.) Applicant agrees that sign will be removed upon the child's fifteenth (15th) birthday or when the child no longer lives at the subject address, whichever is earlier.

The Board of Public Works and Safety may adopt any additional rules and regulations to effectuate this Section but cannot require more proof of impairment than that stated in subsection 2, above. The Application form attached hereto as Exhibit A shall be used by the applicant.

**CREATING SECTION 2-410.2 IN CHAPTER 2 OF THE MICHIGAN CITY MUNICIPAL CODE
TO CREATE AN AIRPORT DONATION FUND**

WHEREAS, the need exists to create an Airport Donation Fund to receipt money contributed to the Michigan City Municipal Airport from contributions and donations from persons, businesses, and organizations, fundraisers, and other possible sources and outline what expenditures may be made from said Fund; and

WHEREAS, in addition, the need exists to create Sec. 2-410.2 in Chapter 2 of the Michigan City Municipal Code for purposes of establishing said Fund.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Michigan City Common Council that Section 2-410.2 in Chapter 2 of the Michigan City Municipal Code shall be created to read as follows:

Section 2-410.2. Airport Donation Fund Established.

There is hereby established an Airport Donation Fund. This Fund shall be a restricted, non-reverting fund. The purpose of this Fund shall be for the receipt of money from contributions from persons, businesses, and organizations, fundraisers, and other possible sources and said monies shall be used by the Board of Aviation Commissioners. Expenditures from this Fund shall be used for the following purposes:

- (1) Materials and supplies for use in the operation of the Commission;
- (2) Education of the public, including promotional, educational, and training supplies, and for community events;
- (3) Training and advocacy for Commission members, including transportation and lodging;
- (4) Educational scholarships; and
- (5) Grants to entities, organizations, or activities identified under Indiana Code as being able to receive aid from a unit, which include the following:
 - a. Parks, playgrounds and recreational facilities and programs (IC 36-10-2-2);
 - b. Museums, cultural, historical, and scientific facilities and programs, and community restitution or service facilities and programs (IC 36-10-2-4);
 - c. Neighborhood centers, community centers, civic centers, convention centers as defined by IC 36-10-1-5, auditoriums, arenas, and stadiums (IC 36-10-2-5);
 - d. Transportation systems (IC 36-9-2-2);
 - e. Hospitals (IC 36-8-2-5); and
 - f. Airports, bus terminals, rail terminals, and transportation facilities (IC 9-2-3).

The Commission shall not use the funds in its Donation Fund for any other purposes than those stated herein.

WHEREAS, the Council finds that the COVID-19 pandemic shows no signs of abating in the near future; and

WHEREAS, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the Indiana State Department of Health and infectious disease experts have recommended implementation of mitigation strategies to help contain the spread of the virus, including, but not limited to, wearing masks, physical distancing of at least six (6') feet, and avoiding gatherings of over 10 people; and

WHEREAS, Governor Holcomb has ordered that masks are to be worn outdoors when the recommended physical distancing cannot be or is not maintained; and

WHEREAS, despite the continuing increase in COVID-19 cases in our City, County, State, and throughout the country, Michigan City's Washington Park has experienced extremely high attendance levels which, among other problems, prevent the implementation of physical distancing and avoiding gatherings of more than 10 people; and

WHEREAS, Chicago's Mayor has closed all Chicago beaches and the Mayor of Whiting has closed Whiting's beach due to public safety concerns arising from the prevalence of the COVID-19 virus and inability to implement appropriate mitigation measures on crowded beaches, all of which has contributed to the extremely high attendance levels in Washington Park and its beach by non-residents; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that Michigan City will continue to experience average or above average summer temperatures throughout the summer season; and

WHEREAS, the Council finds that people are not likely to wear masks when swimming, engaging in physical activity, or sunbathing and will not maintain physical distancing and small groups when attending a very crowded park and beach; and

WHEREAS, in the interest of protecting the health and safety of residents of Michigan City and its visitors, the Council finds that it is necessary for it to adopt rules concerning limiting attendance at and use of Washington Park and its beach and to establish financial penalties for violation of those rules.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Michigan City that:

1. Washington Park, including its beach and parking lot, shall be closed to the public except that LaPorte County residents with a valid 2019 or 2020 beach sticker shall be allowed to enter Washington Park, including its parking lot and beach, seven days per week from 10:00 am to 8:00 pm.
2. With the exception of families residing in the same household, at no time shall groups of more than ten (10) people gather in the Park, including on its beach.
3. At all times, physical distancing of at least six (6) feet shall be maintained by everyone in the Park, including on its beach.
4. The Park Department shall limit parking in the Park to not more than fifty percent (50%) of the authorized parking spaces in the Park at any one time.
5. If their assistance is requested, the Michigan City Police Department shall assist the Park Department personnel in enforcing all applicable rules.
6. The Board of Directors of the Park Department may adopt additional rules and regulations concerning attendance in and use of Washington Park, including its beach, and any other facility over which it has jurisdiction, as long as those rules and regulations are consistent with the provisions of this Ordinance.
7. A violation of the rules for attendance in and use of Washington Park, including its beach, established by this Ordinance and of Rules of the Park Department set forth in Chapter 82, Article 3 of the Michigan City Municipal Code shall be subject to a financial penalty as a violation of the Code pursuant to Chapter 1, Section 1-7 of the Code.
8. The Park Department and Police Department, in consultation with the attorney for the Park Department, are authorized to enforce the rules established by the Ordinance and the Park Department, including the issuance of appropriate citations, and the attorney for the Park Department shall be responsible for prosecuting anyone to whom such a citation is issued.
9. Any civil penalties collected as a result of the issuance of a citation as provided for herein shall be credited to the Park Department's Operating Fund.

ORDINANCE NO. _____

AMENDING SECTION 70-101 IN DIVISION 3 OF CHAPTER 70 OF THE MICHIGAN CITY MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING THE POLICE MERIT COMMISSION

WHEREAS, on October 19, 1982, the Common Council enacted, and on October 20, 1982, the Mayor signed Ordinance No. 2681, which acknowledged that the City had a Police Merit Commission by virtue of the then existing state law codified at I.C. 19-1-29¹ and the City desired to retain said system; and

WHEREAS, with respect to the Michigan City Police Merit Commission, Sec. 70-101 of the Michigan City Municipal Code currently read as follows:

"(a) The civil service commission (hereinafter referred throughout this chapter as "commission") for the Michigan City Police Department is established as provided by IC 19-1-29, et seq. before the same was repealed and now recodified at IC 36-8-3.5, et seq. The commission for the police department shall consist of three members who shall be known and designated as the civilian members of said commission. One of the civilian members of the commission shall be appointed for a term of one year by the mayor; one of the civilian members shall be appointed for a term of two years by the common council; and one of the civilian members shall be appointed for a term of three years upon nomination by the active membership of the police department and appointment by the mayor. The civilian members shall be resident voters of the city and persons of good moral character.

(b) The nomination to be made by the membership of the police department shall be made at a meeting specifically called for that purpose by the chief. The chief shall give at least one week's notice of the meeting to all active members of the police department by posting the notice of the meeting in at least three prominent places in the police station. The notice shall designate the time, place and purpose of the meeting. No one shall be entitled to be present at the meeting and exercise the right to vote unless he is an active member of the police department. Active members who are unable to attend any such meeting may vote by written proxy, provided that no active member present at any meeting shall be entitled to hold and to vote the proxy of more than one absent member. An active member of the police department shall be selected to act as chairman of the meeting. Voting shall be by secret ballot. The person receiving the highest number of votes, including all proxy votes, shall be named as the nominee of the police department.

(c) A person shall be ineligible to serve as a civilian member of the commission if he receives a remuneration as salary for services from the city, other than the per diem compensation as provided for in this section. Every civilian member appointed to the commission shall take and subscribe to an oath that he will conscientiously and faithfully discharge the duties of his office, which oath shall be filed with the board of public works and safety. The civilian members of such commission shall receive a per diem compensation for service in the amount to be fixed by the common council.

(d) Civilian membership vacancies, for any cause, shall be filled by appointment in the same manner as the appointment of that member of the commission. The board of public works and safety may remove any member of the commission at any time for malfeasance, nonfeasance, lack of residency within the city, or inability to serve, which removal shall be under the same rules of procedure that apply to removal of members of the police department. Two civilian members of the commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business;" and

¹ State law pertaining to police and fire merit systems is now codified at I.C. 36-8-3.5, et seq.

WHEREAS, pursuant to I.C. 36-8-3.5-1(b)², because the City had a merit system in place for its police department under former I.C. 19-1-29, the ordinance retaining the system must include a provision “...*under which the commission (or governing body of the merit system) has at least one-third (1/3) of its members elected by the active members of department...*” and

WHEREAS, I.C. 36-8-3.5-6, I.C. 36-8-3.5-7, and I.C. 36-8-3.5-8 state as follows:

“IC 36-8-3.5-6 Merit commission; establishment; appointment of members; qualifications; oath

Sec. 6. (a) A merit commission consisting of five (5) commissioners shall be established for each department of a unit having a merit system. The commissioners are:

- (1) two (2) persons, who must be of different political parties, appointed by the unit's executive;
- (2) one (1) person appointed by the unit's legislative body; and
- (3) two (2) persons, who must be of different political parties, elected by the active members of the department.

Notwithstanding IC 36-1-8-10, political affiliation shall be determined through the voters' registration records of the three (3) most recent primary elections.

(b) Each commissioner must have been a legal resident of the unit for three (3) consecutive years immediately preceding the commissioner's term and must be a person of good moral character. The legislative body may, upon the recommendation of the safety board, determine a per diem to be paid to each commissioner for each day of actual service for the commission. A commissioner must be at least twenty-one (21) years of age. A commissioner may not be an active member of a police or fire department or agency and not more than two (2) of the commissioners may be past members of a police or fire department or agency. In addition, a person may not serve on the commission if the person receives any remuneration as salary from the unit.

(c) Each commissioner shall take an oath of office to conscientiously discharge the commissioner's duties. A signed copy of the oath shall be filed with the safety board.

IC 36-8-3.5-7 Commissioners; terms; tenure

Sec. 7. (a) The term of a commissioner is four (4) years. However, one (1) of the executive's initial selections and one (1) of the department's initial selections are for terms of two (2) years.

(b) A vacancy on the commission shall be filled within thirty (30) days by the appointing or electing authority. The selection is for the remainder of the unexpired term.

(c) A commissioner serves at the pleasure of the appointing or electing authority and may be removed at any time. In the case of a commissioner elected by the department, the safety board shall call a meeting of the active members of the department under the procedures specified in section 4 of this chapter if a recall petition signed by a majority of the active members is submitted to the board.

IC 36-8-3.5 8 Elections; meeting; notice

Sec. 8. (a) An election to be made by the active members of the department shall be made at a meeting called specifically for that purpose by the safety board. The board shall give at least three (3) weeks' notice of the meeting to all active members of the department by posting the notice in prominent locations in stations of the department. The notice shall also be read during shift roll calls. The notice must designate the time, place, and purpose of the meeting.

(b) Only active members of the department may attend the meeting, and at the meeting one (1) of them shall be selected as chair. All voting must be by secret written ballot. The other procedures for holding the meeting may be determined by the safety board and shall be posted in accordance with subsection (a);”

² I.C. 36-8-3.5-1(b) states as follows:

“If a city had a merit system for its police or fire department under the former IC 18-4-12, IC 19-1-7, IC 19-1-14, IC 19-1-14.2, IC 19-1-14.3, IC 19-1-14.5, IC 19-1-20, IC 19-1-21, IC 19-1-29, IC 19-1-29.5, IC 19-1-31, IC 19-1-31.5, or IC 19-1-37.5, it may retain that system by ordinance of the city legislative body passed before January 1, 1983. The ordinance must initially incorporate all the provisions of the prior statute but may be amended by the legislative body after December 31, 1984. The ordinance retaining the system must be amended, if necessary, to include a provision under which the commission (or governing board of the merit system) has at least one-third (1/3) of its members elected by the active members of the department as prescribed by section 8 of this chapter. Each elected commission member must:

- (1) be a person of good moral character; and
- (2) except for a member of a fire department having a merit system established under IC 19-1-37.5, not be an active member of a police or fire department or agency.”

WHEREAS, after reviewing the current language of Section 70-101 in the Michigan City Code, the need exists to follow Indiana state law regarding the police merit commission, including, but not limited to, the number of commission members, the composition of the commission members, the tenure of commission members, the qualifications of commission members, the removal of commission members, and the election of commission members by the Police Department.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Michigan City Common Council that Section 70-101 in Division 3 of Chapter 70 of the Michigan City Municipal Code shall now be amended to read as follows:

Section 70-101. Merit Commission; Establishment; Qualifications to Serve; Terms; Oaths, Removal.

(a) Establishment. The civil service commission (hereinafter referred throughout this chapter as "commission") for the Michigan City Police Department is established as provided by IC 19-1-29, et seq. before the same was repealed and now recodified at IC 36-8-3.5, et seq. The commission for the police department shall consist of five (5) members who shall be known and designated as the civilian members of said commission. The commissioners shall be appointed as follows:

1. Two (2) persons, who must be of different political parties, appointed by the Mayor;
2. One (1) person appointed by the Common Council; and
3. Two (2) persons, who must be of different political parties, elected by the active members of the Police Department.

Political affiliation shall be determined through the voter's registration records of the three (3) most recent primary elections.

(b) Qualifications; Oath. Qualifications to serve are as follows:

1. A commissioner must successfully complete a criminal background check.
2. A commissioner must have been a legal resident of the unit for three (3) consecutive years immediately preceding the commissioner's term and must be a person of good moral character.
3. A commissioner must be at least twenty-one (21) years of age.
4. A commissioner may not be an active member of a police or fire department or agency and not more than two (2) of the commissioners may be past members of a police or fire department or agency.
5. A person may not serve on the commission if the person receives any remuneration as salary from the unit, other than the compensation as provided for in this Section.

Each commissioner shall take an oath of office to conscientiously discharge the commissioner's duties. A signed copy of the oath shall be filed with the City Clerk's Office and the Michigan City Board of Public Works & Safety.

(c) Compensation. A commissioner may be entitled to compensation as set forth in the salary ordinance adopted by the Common Council.

(d) Terms; Tenure; and Removal.

1. The term of a commissioner is four (4) years. However, one (1) of the executive's initial selections and one (1) of the department's initial selections are for terms of two (2) years.
2. A vacancy on the commission shall be filled within thirty (30) days by the appointing or electing authority. The selection is for the remainder of the unexpired term.
3. A commissioner serves at the pleasure of the appointing or electing authority and may be removed at any time. In the case of a commissioner elected by the Police Department, the Michigan City Board of Public Works & Safety shall

call a meeting of the active members of the Police Department under the procedures specified in subsection (e) below if a recall petition signed by a majority of the active members is submitted to the Board.

(e) Police Department Elections; Meetings; and Notice.

1. An election to be made by the active members of the department shall be made at a meeting called specifically for that purpose by the Michigan City Board of Public Works & Safety. The notice shall also be read during shift roll calls. The notice must designate the time, place, and purpose of the meeting.

Active members who are unable to attend any such meeting may vote by written proxy, provided that no active member present at any meeting shall be entitled to hold and to vote the proxy of more than one absent member. Section 2. The fringe benefit program provided by the City includes medical insurance, vacation pay, vacation bonus, participation in the Indiana Public Retirement System (INPRS), and sick leave, as defined in the City Employee Handbook for non-contract, full-time employees in the following departments: Mayor, Controller, Clerk, Engineer, Personnel, City Hall, Attorney, Planning & Inspection, Cemeteries, Police, Fire, Aviation, Human Rights, Central Services, Vector Control, Street, Transit, Central Maintenance Barker Civic Center, Park and the Promise Scholarship Director. Also included in the fringe benefit program are the following: the City Engineer, who shall maintain a minimum of thirty (30) hours per week as well as serving on or attending the meetings of the Board of Public Works & Safety and Plan Commission; and the Corporation Counsel, who shall maintain thirty (30) hours per week, represent City departments in grievances, participate in all contract negotiations, represent and attend the meetings of the Board of Public Works & Safety, and prosecute ordinance violations.

Section 3. For the Animal Control Officer, the fringe benefit program provided by the City includes certification pay at the rate of \$500 per year per certification with a maximum of three (3) certifications to be divided and included with the bi-weekly pay.

Section 4. The fringe benefit program is further defined as providing a longevity program for non-contract employees who have worked three (3) or more years continuously in a full-time capacity, the financial increment shall be \$450 for each three (3) years of service to a maximum of \$3,600.

Section 5. Personnel who are subject to emergency calls out outside of regular business hours will be provided with a City take-home vehicle. These include public safety personnel (Police and Fire) and one service employee per department per day when their service calls require tools that are carried in the vehicle (Animal Control, Vector Control, Parks & Recreation and Aviation).

Section 6. Except for salaries included in Section 8 below, all salaries are annual and shall be paid in equal amounts on a bi-weekly basis over the number of bi-weekly periods in the calendar year. Set salaries are in effect for all payrolls issued in the calendar year governed by this ordinance.

Section 7. All salaries and fringe benefits for union workers are subject to the terms, conditions, and limitations specified in the respective labor contracts for the year governed by this ordinance.

Section 8. Members of the following boards and commissions shall receive compensation in the amounts listed for that board or commission, payable the following month. Annual Salaries are the maximum amounts to be paid for that position, and the columns below in this Section depict if that position is paid monthly or paid per meeting attended. Council Members and Department Heads who serve on these bodies shall not receive the per diem.

ADOPTING POLICY TO ALLOW 5% OF RIVERBOAT FUNDS TO BE USED TO FUND THE CITY'S OPERATING EXPENDITURES FROM THE GENERAL FUND AND DEDICATING 50% OF RIVERBOAT REVENUES TO INCREASE THE RAINY DAY FUND BALANCE UP TO A MINIMUM OF \$6 MILLION DOLLARS

WHEREAS, in the past, the Common Council has passed several Ordinances limiting percentage of Riverboat revenues that could be used for the City's normal and routine operating expenses paid from the City's General Fund; and

WHEREAS, in the past, the Common Council passed Ordinance No. 4285 creating a Rainy Day Fund for the City the terms and conditions of which Ordinance is now codified in Section 2-402 of the Michigan City Municipal Code; and

WHEREAS, due to the dire financial condition of the City resulting from adverse impact on City revenues, including, but not limited to, Riverboat revenues, from the COVID-19 pandemic, City expenditures exceeding City revenues in prior years, and the lack of any long range financial planning by the City to prepare for such adverse financial situations, the Common Council finds that it is in the best interest of the City to take prompt action to require substantial and effective steps be taken to improve the financial status of the City and prepare it for adverse financial circumstances that occur in the future; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council finds that creating a substantial balance in the City's Rainy Day Fund, funded on an ongoing basis with a part of the Riverboat revenues it receives, is essential to the future financial viability of the City; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council finds that strictly limiting the amount of Riverboat revenues that can be used for the City's normal and routine operating expenses paid from the City's General Fund is necessary to allow the proper balance to be achieved in the Rainy Day Fund as soon as reasonably possible.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Michigan City, Indiana, as follows:

SECTION 1: For purposes of the City's 2021 and succeeding years' budgets for General Fund operating expenditures, no more than 5% of Riverboat funds received by the City may be used for normal and routine operating expenses in preparing the City's Budgets for the General Fund.

50 % of Riverboat funds received by the City shall be deposited as they are received into the City's Rainy Day Fund until the balance in that Fund reaches at least \$6 Million.

The remainder of the Riverboat funds received by the City, including income from investment thereof, shall be reserved for capital expenditures for capital improvement and development projects in the City.

SECTION 2: For purposes of this Ordinance, "capital expenditures" and "operating expenses" shall be defined as stated in Exhibit 1 which is attached hereto and incorporated herein.

CREATING SECTION 82-68 IN ARTICLE III (PARK RULES) IN CHAPTER 82 (PARKS AND RECREATION) OF THE MICHIGAN CITY MUNICIPAL CODE TO PROVIDE A MECHANISM FOR ENFORCEMENT FOR ALL PARK RULES

WHEREAS, Sec. 82-62 through Sec. 82-66 of the Michigan City Municipal Code prescribe various rules pertaining to property under the control and jurisdiction of the Michigan City Park Board; and

WHEREAS, over the years, the Park Board has adopted additional rules pertaining to property under their jurisdiction, which include but are not limited to the following: no pets outside of vehicles because no dogs allowed in City parks, no littering, no ground fires, grills permitted in designated areas only, hunting prohibited on all park property, no motorized vehicles except in designated parking areas, no metal detectors on grass, no grilling on beach; and

WHEREAS, the Common Council desires to formally recognize any and all rules adopted by the Park Board, now or in the future, and declare that a violation of a Park Board Rule is an ordinance violation subjecting the violator to the general penalty provisions set forth in Sec. 1-7 of the Michigan City Municipal Code.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Michigan City Common Council that Section 82-86 shall be created in Article III (Park Rules) in Chapter 82 (Parks and Recreation) of the Michigan City Municipal Code and shall read as follows:

Section 82-86. Violation of Rules Adopted by Michigan City Park Board.

- (a) Any and all rules formally adopted by the Michigan City Park Board, not otherwise specified in Sec. 82-62 through Sec. 82-66, shall be treated as if they are fully set forth in this Section and it shall be unlawful for a person to violate the same.
- (b) Any violation of a rule formally adopted by the Michigan City Park Board shall be considered a Code violation and may subject the violator to the issuance of a citation and/or the removal of such person in violation from Michigan City Park Board property. Violations under this Section are subject to the general penalty provisions set forth in Sec. 1-7 of this Code.
- (c) The Michigan City Park Board shall post all park rules in a conspicuous manner on all park property and shall also post all park rules on their respective City website.
